Rebecca Estelle has hated pumpkins ever since she was a girl when pumpkins were often the only food her family had. When an enormous pumpkin falls off a truck and smashes in her yard, she shovels dirt over the pieces and forgets about them. But those slimy pumpkin smithereens sprout up in autumn, and Rebecca Estelle finds a sea of pumpkins in her garden.

Kitchen garden prompts: Some themes to think about: scarcity and surplus.

The Australian desert: for thousands of years the only changes here were made by the wind, the willy-willies and sometimes the rain. Then a hundred years ago people from Europe settled in the desert and planted seeds from the other side of the world. The Story of Rosy Dock is the story of one of the settlers who followed them, and her garden in the wilderness, a garden that is beautiful – but with an unexpected flowering.

Kitchen garden prompts: Explore seeds and settlement, landscape change and introduced species in Australia. Categories: #garden

The Reasons for Seasons (1995)

by Gail Gibbons

Cold winters, hot summers — year after year the seasons repeat themselves. But what causes them? Why is there winter in the southern hemisphere at the same time there is summer in the northern hemisphere? In summertime, why is it still light out in the evening? With simple language appropriate for young readers. Categories: #garden

From Seed to Plant (1991)

by Gail Gibbons

Introduces young readers to the processes of pollination, seed formation, and germination. Important vocabulary is reinforced with accessible explanation and colorful, clear diagrams showing the parts of plants, the wide variety of seeds, and how they grow.

Kitchen garden prompts: Seed germination; life cycle of a plant.

by William Toye, illustrated by Elizabeth Cleaver A classic legend about the changing seasons. Categories: #garden

Dragonsong (1976)

by Anne McCaffrey

Fifteen-year-old Menolly allies with magnificent dragons in the first book in the Harper Hall trilogy, set within science fiction legend Anne McCaffrey's beloved and bestselling Dragonriders of Pern series.

Kitchen garden prompts: A major plot device in this fantasy for young adults is 'thread', the rain that burns all living things. How would you grow a garden in such a world?

by Robert McCloskey

The story features a little girl, Sal, and her mother as they go and pick blueberries for winter – and a bear cub and his mother as they go and eat berries for winter from the other side of the same hill.

A cherry stone falls into the landlord's head, and a tree grows ...

The Very Hungry Caterpillar (1969)

by Eric Carle

One sunny Sunday, the caterpillar was hatched out of a tiny egg. He was very hungry. On Monday, he ate through one apple; on Tuesday, he ate through three plums – and still he was hungry. When full at last, he made a cocoon around himself and went to sleep, to wake up a few weeks later wonderfully transformed into a butterfly. Kitchen garden prompts: This classic is perfect to help

spark investigations into pests and beneficial insects, insect evidence in our garden, metamorphosis and life cycles of insects.

by Beatrix Potter

The Tale of Peter Rabbit follows mischievous and disobedient young Peter Rabbit as he gets into, and is chased around, the garden of Mr. McGregor. He escapes and returns home to his mother, who puts him to bed after offering him chamomile tea.
